As most hens are expected to start laying again after this time they need to maintain their mineral / vits and protein intake. I absolutely fail to understand why anyone would want to leave birds in this situation for weeks on end if there is no intention of hatching. Its simply to break and effective given some care. Maybe it is just me.
