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"my copy of Dolmens for the Dead, Megalith Building through the World, by Roger Joussaume, has pictures of Dolmen from 'Palestine' in it that are distinctively different from those in NW Europe, it is clearly not well established that they are 'identical'. Unless you are a follower of Yair Davidiy, of course, who does make this claim. "

Megaliths (my guess is you aren't really talking about only dolmen) are found all over the world, some very old, some pretty recent. But they differ in age, design, associated artefacts and burial types, etc. And there are vast areas where there are none also.
