Fletcher, "History of Architecture"
Stierlin, "Encyclopedia of World Architecture"

The two best references I've found for dimensions of pyramids are, not surprisingly, Peter Tompkins' "Mysteries of Egypt" and "Mexican Mysteries" Well, I'd not suggest relying on Tompkins for anything _other_ than

dimensions – and not rely on those either, if their "preciseness" is necessary for some wacky theory or another.
