It's from Liberty and Property, 1958. Von Mises was never an anarcho-capitalist, he always vigorously asserted the absolute need for government. In today's nomenclature, he was a minarchist. Hayek actually went quite a bit further than that in laying out the legitimate functions of the state. Anarcho-capitalism didn't really come onto the scene until the early 1970's with Rothbard's publication of For A New Liberty and David Friedman's, The Machinery of Freedom. It largely hit a dead end at that point, for reasons elaborated in Nozick's ASU.

Nozick's own reasoning is spurious, as Rothbard has also demonstrated.

Rothbard has been comprehensively refuted, not least by events in
