I am trying to implement a paper (for some time now) but some of the things done are not at all clear.
Now, the person in question seems to have written a PhD Thesis (in the USA) about that topic. I hope to find more information in there. But how do I proceed to obtain it?

If you know the university/department in which the thesis was written, you could try to contact them directly. If you know the author's current affiliation, you could contact him/her personally. Another possibility is to contact "University Microfilms" in Ann Arbor, Michigan; they have thousands of theses available at a modest cost, but usually in a small format obtained from magnifying microfilm images.
