Until I stopped seeing him for the Lyme and went to the LLMD (because he would treat long term BUT only with doxy), he ran an ELISA on me every month. I think he is mistaken using that to monitor my progress, from what I have read, but its interesting to me because the 4 ELISA tests I had were all positive, all above 2 and 3 for the titer over the course of 4 months. I wonder if there is documentation I can give him about whether or not that's really helping him monitor his patients...do you know?
